2013 Principles of Liberty Scorecard

The Principles of Liberty (POL) scorecard is now complete and being published at www.principlesofliberty.org. To very briefly summarize, there are three broad steps to the work that POL puts together: 1) Identify Principles of good governance, 2) Apply those Principles to Colorado state legislation to determine whether the legislation supports/opposes those Principles and rate the bill accordingly, 3) Tabulate voting data on POL-rated bills to identify trends for all 100 legislators for each individual principle, as well as an overall aggregate score.

POL rated 238 bills this year. This number is consistent with the number of bills rated in the past. Our legislative analysis for the 2013 legislative session, along with the voting records of state legislators, generated a total of 43,561 points of data this year. This creates a statistically significant set of data to analyze in order to identify clear trends and relative patterns among the voting records of all 100 legislators.

Identify Principles

The POL Principles are clearly defined on the web site at www.principlesofliberty.org, so we will not re-print them here. We have also summarized a review that we completed of each of the 3 major political party platforms for 2012 (Dem, Rep, Lib) to see if there was common ground among the parties on these principles. We found that all three groups hold common ground on these Principles. Their adherence to these principles may clearly be questioned, but the fact is that they all recognize, to some extent, the existence of these Principles. This review of the three party platforms will also be posted on the website.

Legislative Analysis

The annual legislative analysis is a robust effort to apply the POL principles to proposed Colorado state legislation to determine whether the legislation supports/opposes these principles. This work was completed weekly, every week, during the 2013 session. POL rated 238 bills this year. Every bill that was rated by POL has a corresponding worksheet posted on the POL website to document the work and the rationale behind the rating.

Scorecard

After the session is completed, POL tabulates all of the votes in (a) the first assigned committee in each chamber, and (b) the final votes on the floor of each chamber, however far a bill may progress. {POL has subscribed annually to, and would like to acknowledge the work of, Colorado Capitol Watch for their meticulous collection of the voting records for the Colorado State Legislature.} Each bill that is rated by POL typically has 2 or 3 applicable principles. So for every bill rated by POL, there could be anywhere from a handful of data points to as many as a few hundred data points generated from the votes of all 100 state legislators on that bill. Our legislative analysis for the 2013 legislative session generated a total of 43,561 points of data. These data are compiled for each legislator. The typical number of data points per legislator ranged from about 350-500.

POL used 7 of the 9 Principles on this year's scorecard, leaving 2 of the Principles off of the scorecard because they did not have a statistically significant amount of data to report (averaging a number of data points only in the single digits to low teens per legislator). Since there was not enough data to

identify trends in any meaningful, consistent way for those 2 Principles, they were not included in the 2013 scorecard.

Overview

The Senate Republicans - had consistently lower scores in 2013 vs. 2012. While in 2012 there were 10 out of 15 Republicans who scored higher than 80%, this year only two Republicans managed to score as high as 80%, with the highest Senate score going to Senator Kevin Lundberg at 80.2%. Senator Lundberg's 1st place score in the Senate would only place him in 9th position in the House. Senate Republican Leadership did continue their trend of leading their party in a positive way, garnering the 3rd, 5th, 7th and 9th best scores in the Senate. Senate Republican scores ranged from 42.1% to 80.2%.

The House Republicans - scored in a range that was roughly the same as 2012, but that doesn't tell the whole story. Four of the five top scorers from 2012 are no longer in the House (2 moved to the Senate, 1 did not seek office, and 1 was put into a new seat with another Republican due to re-apportionment). However, 4 of the top 5 scorers in the House for 2013 were Freshmen Republicans. House Republican Leadership, although made up of some different personnel than in 2012, continued a trend of "leading from behind", with leadership bringing up the rear of the Republican Party scores in 27th, 22nd, and 17th place. Representative Libby Szabo, the Assistant Minority Leader, was the only Republican in House leadership who managed to crack the top 10 in the House, finishing 9th with a respectable score of 80%. House Republican scores ranged from 49.7% to 94.7%.

The Senate Democrats - could have saved themselves (and taxpayers) a lot of money by just mailing it in this past session, since their votes were obviously pre-determined. Democrat scores ranged from 8.5% to 12.9%. That is one tight range. And that's not because we only rated a few bills. Remember, POL rated 238 bills this year. The Senate Democrats' voting records generated 8,428 data points on POL rated bills this year. The number of data points per Democratic legislator ranged from a low of 346 to a high of 495. Despite this good sample size, the narrow range of Democrat scores is alarming. In 2012, Democrat scores in the Senate ranged from 22% to 35%, a tight range to be sure. But this year's range of 4.4% is quite the anomaly.

The House Democrats - also could have saved themselves (and taxpayers) a lot of money by just mailing it in this past session, since their votes were obviously pre-determined. Democrat scores ranged from 7.8% to 12.1%, with one single Democrat outlier at 17.7%. Again, that's not because we only rated a few bills. The House Democrats' voting records generated 16,765 data points on POL rated bills this year. The number of data points per Democratic legislator ranged from a low of 369 to a high of 523. Despite this good sample size, the narrow range of Democrat scores is alarming. In 2012,

Democrat scores in the House ranged from 22% to 46%, with one outlier scoring a 65%. Again, this year's range of only 4.3% is quite the anomaly.

Future Reports

POL will be doing some additional statistical analysis on legislator voting records for the 2013 session, based upon ALL of the votes for the entire session. In particular, we want to look at the correlation of Democrat voting records in an effort to get an idea of the mathematical probability that their votes would be so... *similar*.

The Principles of Liberty – Recognized by All Three Major Parties

The seven Principles used in the 2013 Legislator Scorecard are identified on the following pages. The Principles are clearly defined on the POL website at ww.principlesofliberty.org. Every one of these seven Principles are supported to some extent by statements made within the **2012 Republican Party Platform**, the **2012 Libertarian Party Platform**, and the **2012 Democratic Party Platform**. As evidence, below are direct quotes that are related to the POL Principles on this year's scorecard that were pulled from the published 2012 National Party Platforms of all three political parties.

Individual Liberty:

- "Liberty alone fosters scientific inquiry, technological innovation, entrepreneurship, and information exchange. "
- "...advocacy of religious liberty..."
- "...shared belief in... personal liberty..."

- “The Ninth Amendment: Affirming People’s Rights”

Personal Responsibility:

2012 Democrat Party Platform:

- “... responsibility should be rewarded...”
- “... hard work and personal responsibility.”
- “... where hard work pays, and where responsibility is rewarded.”
- “... responsible homeowners...”
- “...reward hard work and demand personal responsibility.”

2012 Libertarian Party Platform:

- “Individuals should be free to make choices for themselves and to accept responsibility for the consequences of the choices they make.”
- “...the education of children is a parental responsibility...”
- “Parents should have control of and responsibility for all funds expended for their children's education.”
- “Retirement planning is the responsibility of the individual, not the government.”

2012 Republican Party Platform:

- “... responsible borrowers.”
- “...promotes personal responsibility...”
- “With every right comes a responsibility.”
- “... we recognize the individual responsibility...”
- “... personal responsibility for health maintenance.”
- “... take responsibility for planning their own retirement decades from now.”

- “Parents are responsible for the education of their children.”

Property Rights:

2012 Democrat Party Platform:

- The protection of “intellectual property” is mentioned 6 times, always in an international context.
- Interestingly, this is the only use of the word “property” in the entire Democrat Platform. There is no mention in the entire 32 page document of “private property” or “property rights”, nor is there any other use of the word “property” in the 2012 Democratic Party Platform.

2012 Libertarian Party Platform:

- (3) the right to property -- accordingly we oppose all government interference with private property, such as confiscation, nationalization, and eminent domain, and support the prohibition of robbery, trespass, fraud, and misrepresentation.”
- “People should not be forced to sacrifice their lives and property for the benefit of others.”
- “...be secure in our persons, homes, and property.”
- “Government exists to protect the rights of every individual including life, liberty and property.”
- “The only legitimate use of force is in defense of individual rights — life, liberty, and justly acquired property — against aggression.”
- “The only proper role of government in the economic realm is to protect property rights, adjudicate disputes, and provide a legal framework in which voluntary trade is protected.”
- “Property rights are entitled to the same protection as all other human rights. The owners of property have the full right to control, use, dispose of, or in any manner enjoy, their property without interference, until and unless the exercise of their control infringes the valid rights of others.”
- “We oppose all violations of the right to private property, liberty of contract, and freedom of trade.”
- “Free markets and property rights stimulate the technological innovations and behavioral changes required to protect our environment and ecosystems.”

2012 Republican Party Platform:

- “intellectual property” is mentioned 4 times
- “The Fifth Amendment: Protecting Private Property”
- “... for without property rights, individual rights are diminished.”
- “The Fifth Amendment: Protecting Private Property”

Free Markets:

2012 Democratic Party Platform:

- “... we will continue to work to protect... the functioning of fair and competitive markets...”
- “We know that the free market only works when there are rules of the road to ensure that competition is fair, open, and honest.”
- “Currencies must be market-driven so no nation has an unfair advantage.”

2012 Libertarian Party Platform:

- “...the resultant economic system, the only one compatible with the protection of individual rights, is the free market.”
- “A free and competitive market allocates resources in the most efficient manner.”
- “Free markets and property rights stimulate the technological innovations and behavioral changes required to protect our environment and ecosystems.”
- “We favor free-market banking...”

- “Industries should be governed by free markets.”
- “Education is best provided by the free market...”
- “We favor restoring and reviving a free market health care system.”

2012 Republican Party Platform:

- “Republicans will pursue free market policies...”
- “... committed to the principles of open markets...”
- “... we will not pick winners and losers in the energy marketplace. Instead, we will let the free market and the public’s preferences determine the industry outcomes.”
- “... a market-based approach for renewable energy resources...”
- “Then the American people, through the free market, can advance affordable and responsible healthcare reform that meets the needs and concerns of patients and providers.”
- “Consumer Choice in Education”

Limited Government:

2012 Democrat Party Platform:

- “Rules should be simpler and more flexible, and regulations should be based on sound science and secure Americans’ freedom of choice.”
- “Looking to make our government leaner, smarter, and more consumer-friendly...”
- Interestingly, there is not a single comment in the 2012 Democratic Party Platform on “limiting” the role of government. The only things that the Democratic Party Platform mentions a desire to limit are “greenhouse gas emissions”, “fossil-fuel-fired power plants”, and working internationally “... toward an agreement to set emission limits in unison with other emerging powers.”

2012 Libertarian Party Platform:

- “Criminal laws should be limited to violation of the rights of others through force or fraud...”
- “Government is constitutionally limited so as to prevent the infringement of individual rights by the government itself.”

2012 Republican Party Platform:

- “Trust people. Limit government.”
- “It must be downsized and limited...”
- “Perhaps the greatest political document ever written, it defines the purposes and limits of government...”
- “We must limit injunctions by activist judges...”
- “...limit federal requirements on both private insurance and Medicaid...”
- “... limits on judicial discretion...”

- “We call for a reduction, through attrition, in the federal payroll of at least 10 percent and the adjustment of pay scales and benefits to reflect those of the private sector.”

Fiscal Responsibility:

2012 Democrat Party Platform:

- “... Democrats took decisive steps to restore fiscal responsibility...”
- “... making the hard decisions to cut our deficit and put our fiscal house in order.”
- “In our current fiscal environment, we must also make tough budgetary decisions across the board...”

2012 Libertarian Party Platform:

- “Government should not incur debt, which burdens future generations without their consent. We support the passage of a "Balanced Budget Amendment" to the U.S. Constitution, provided that the budget is balanced exclusively by cutting expenditures, and not by raising taxes.”

2012 Republican Party Platform:

- “The Republican Party is committed to saving Medicare and Medicaid. Unless the programs’ fiscal ship is righted,...”

- “... bring them in line with the rule of law.”
- “Promoting... the Rule of Law”
- “...Democrats know that a commitment to the rule of law... are essential...”
- “Because the public’s rights, freedoms, and access to economic opportunity depend on the rule of law...”

2012 Libertarian Party Platform:

- “All efforts by government to redistribute wealth, or to control or manage trade, are improper in a free society.”

2012 Republican Party Platform:

- “Adhere to the rule of law.”
- “Promoting Transparent, Accountable Governance and the Rule of Law”
- “...strengthens the rule of law...”
- “... bring them in line with the rule of law.”
- “a commitment to the rule of law and effective judicial institutions are essential to sustainable economic development and must remain a core American value in the years to come.”
- “...access to economic opportunity depend on the rule of law...”,
